Message from the President & CEO



With our partners at The Banff Centre and ACTRA (Alliance of Canadian Cinema Television Radio Artists) CWWA presented the 13th session of the acclaimed Women In the Director's Chair Workshop (WIDC). Fifty film and television industry, arts organizations and individuals across Canada contributed cash and in kind support to the WIDC program, awards and fellowships this year.

The level of esteem for the calibre of talent and skills development of directors, actors, crafts people and technicians delivered through the WIDC program has increased significantly over the last decade. With more than one hundred and ten director alumnae and given its growing reputation for excellence, CWWA is now regularly being requested by alumnae and industry to deliver more and more programming.

Despite the continuing challenges of fundraising for professional development with a gender equity focus, especially in the current economic climate, the 2008/09 fiscal offered CWWA great opportunities to expand WIDC program offerings.

The CTV / CHUM Benefits, a \$335,000 pledge over three years, allowed CWWA to increase scholarships to WIDC director participants, create a new \$10,000 cash Director Development Award, and a new Career Advancement Module (CAM) delivered in collaboration with three women's film festivals and events across Canada.

The WIDC 2009 Newsletter boasted updates on career advances and **project successes** from **53% of our Director Alumnae**, however general participation rates for women directors in feature film and television series in Canada remain unacceptably low, averaging 20%. The work of CWWA and the WIDC program remains not only relevant but vital to ensuring that the women's eye view is fairly represented on large and small screens.

Message from the President & CEO continued

While CWWA does not employ a staff, it has been my continuing honour to facilitate the activities of the society this past year, including delivering member and alumnae follow up mentorship, program adjudication, curriculum development and producing the WIDC programs. Serving on seven film and television industry committees, councils and coalitions including the National Training Advisory Council (Screen), BC MPPIA Education and Training Committee, Women In Film and Television Vancouver President's Task Force, and Langara Studio 58 Film Program Advisory Committee, has extended the reach of CWWA and the WIDC program further into the community.

I wish to extend special thanks, for the continuing collaboration of the WIDC Presenting Partners, The Banff Centre and ACTRA and their representatives to the CWWA Board of Directors, Susan Kennard and Brian Gromoff, along with the WIDC alumnae that round out the CWWA Board of Directors. The success of the society and its endeavours are fostered by all of these individuals through their insight and leadership. It has also been a delight to work with Board members Tammy Bentz, Rita Shelton Deverell, Jinder Oujla-Chalmers and Katie Tallo, WIDC alumnae Kelly-Ruth Mercier, Irene Angelico and Teresa Hannigan as well as the industry representatives who volunteered their time on various adjudication committees. A major thank you to the senior professionals that volunteered their time to mentor WIDC participants. This term we also say thank you and good-bye to Board member, Anita Doron who we continue to support in her directing career.

The challenges that so many not-for-profit organizations face to ensure adequate and sustained cash and in kind resources to undertake the important work we do, are many. As we demonstrate respect, straight forward communication and work collaboratively towards common goals, we are all made stronger and more successful in our efforts.

Here's to a creative and productive 2009 – 2010 fiscal!



Presenting Partners







Since its inception The Women In the Director's Chair Workshop (WIDC) has been presented in partnership with The Banff Centre and ACTRA. Creative Women Workshops Association was formed as a result of this initial collaboration in order to be an umbrella for the program.

As in previous years, Modules One and Two of WIDC took place at The Banff Centre, and The Banff Centre contributed production and editing studios, equipment and support personnel as well as logistical planning and coordination. Participants were housed on campus and dined in the newly constructed Vistas Dining Room.

Only ACTRA full and apprentice members (actors) are accepted into the Acting Ensemble of the program. More than seventy-five actors applied for the ensemble this year and nine were selected by the WIDC Producer and Mentor Actor. ACTRA through the National office and its various branches, unions and the AFBS, sponsors the full costs of the attendance of the Acting Ensemble and the Mentor Actor.

In addition to overseeing the development, delivery, promotion and fundraising for the WIDC program, including Module Three Alumnae Mentorship, Workshops, Awards and Fellowships as well as the new CTV WIDC CAM, and other initiatives on its own and with the support of additional sponsors, CWWA delivered a commissioned professional development program for Telefilm Canada.

WIDC Programs - Module 1

Story Incubation Module (SIM)

December 7 to 10, 2008 The Banff Centre, AB

Sponsored again by CBC, the SIM is the first Module of the WIDC Program and a prerequisite for Module Two, the Prep Production and Post Production Module (PPPM).

Seven mid-career Canadian women director were selected by a nationally representative jury of industry professionals including WIDC alumnae. This year, for the first time, one international participant was accepted into the program as a pilot initiative with New Zealand.

The SIM, taught in part by Jungian expert and award-winning author, Carolyn Mamchur focuses on story structure and character development through the understanding of Jungian personality type, temperament theory and archetypes. It provides a forum for private and group feedback on the original fiction script the director participant brings to develop at the program.

CBC Television Executive in Charge of Production, Mary Quinn attended the SIM and led a talk on working with the CBC. The Mentor Story Editor, Actor, DOP and Production Designer also led talks and private sessions with the director participants. The month of follow up story-editing led by Mentor Story Editor Linda Coffey, advanced the directors' stories in preparation for the PPPM.

WIDC Programs - Module 2

Prep, Production & Post production Module (PPPM)

January 16 to February 2, 2009 The Banff Centre, AB

Led by acclaimed director Kari Skogland, and supported by seven additional senior professionals, Iris Quinn (Actor), Roger Vernon, Harvey La Rocque (DOPs), John Blackie (Production Designer), Lisa Binkley, Daria Ellerman (Picture Editors), and Jonathan Stevens (Sound Editor), the eight WIDC director participants received mentorship in all areas of prep, production and post production. They worked with nine ACTRA actors, fifty DGC, IATSE, and volunteer crewmembers and each directed and edited an original short fiction work in addition to other hands-on production exercises within a safe, collegial yet professional learning environment.

The Banff Centre's BNMI Program Manager, Cindy Schatkoski, Coordinator Jean Macpherson and WIDC Line Producers Allison Yearwood, Stacy Fish and Kate Weiss supported the administrative elements of the program. Banff Centre staff time during the workshop, particularly Digital Film Production (formerly CEE), Music Sound & Audio (MSA) and Theatre Arts, contributed greatly to WIDC 2009.

To protect the learning process the works created at WIDC are not for broadcast or festival screening.






Calgary International Film Festival, WIDC Panel

TELEFILM CANADA Feature It! Program

November 2008 Montreal, QC

For the second year in a row, CWWA was commissioned by Telefilm Canada to deliver Phase 1 of the Feature It! program, a four-day intensive for midcareer English-language writers, directors and producers in Montreal.

Produced / facilitated by Carol Whiteman, Carolyn Mamchur delivered a mini-SIM, Ken Chubb delivered a story-editing workshop, and Jan Nathanson co-produced a market immersion that introduced participants to distributors, broadcasters and funding agency representatives.

Based on their five-page story synopses five writers were selected for the program and received training and predevelopment funding to advance their stories to a polished synopsis and two key scenes. Mid-career producers attended the training and after pairing up producer/writer participants, two of five eligible projects were selected to receive \$20,000 Telefilm development funds.

Fourteen content creators attended this workshop, including WIDC alumna Alana Cymerman who was one of the five writers selected for Phase 2 predevelopment funding.
