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WIDC Annual Report

Year-end March 31, 2020

Women In the Director's Chair (WIDC) is a Canadian screen industry initiative that is the main activity of the national non-profit organization, Creative Women Workshops Association (CWWA). CWWA is governed by a volunteer Board of Directors made up of alumnae directors, Mary M. Frymire (secretary treasurer), Nikila Cole, Patricia Harris Seeley (Alumnae Reps), ACTRA representative, Heather Allin, and WIDC co-creator and CWWA co-founder, Dr. Carol Whiteman.

WIDC at a glance... (as of March 31, 2020)

- 274 WIDC alumnae directors across Canada (1997 to 2020)

During fiscal 2019-20, WIDC continued to offer professional leadership and story development, awards and production support for Canadian women screen directors. Engaging the talents of professional ACTRA actors, IATSE DOP's and other industry executives and experts, this past year, 26 Canadian women / gender minority directors have directly participated in WIDC program offerings. All director participants and WIDC award winners are selected by peer jury process. Here are some highlights of this year's WIDC activities.

STORY DEVELOPMENT

Story & Leadership (S&L) supporting the development of 8 directors (Laura Adkin, Camille Hollett-French, Sarah Galea-Davis, Monique Hurteau, Nimisha Mukerji, Susanne Serres, Lana Slezic), and their fiction feature films

and TV series. Part 1 of S&L was delivered in Vancouver with lead mentors Siobhan Devine (Mentor Director), Linda Coffey (Mentor Story Editor) and Lori Triolo (Mentor Actor), Jungian expert Dr. Carolyn Mamchur (Instructor), Guest DOPs Amy Belling, CSC and Thomas Billingsley, CSC; and UBCP/ACTRA actor/filmmaker Garwin Sanford who led an action and fight choreography workshop. Part 2 of S&L, WIDC Whistler Film Festival Industry Immersion, offered director participants festival passes to attend the summit, screenings and the festival signature women's networking breakfast and facilitated access to 10 more industry experts including producers, directors, CBC, Telefilm Canada, Telus STORYHIVE, Independent Production Fund, and distributor A-71. S&L concludes at the end of March 2020 as the directors receive up to 6 hours each of Follow Up individual consultations including Part 3 (story polish) with Mentor Story Editor, Linda Coffey, and Part 4 (career coaching) with Dr. Carol Whiteman.

CAREER ADVANCEMENT MODULE

Three separate cohorts of Directors meet with industry experts during a full week of facilitated roundtables and one-to- one sessions during each of the three international women's film festivals in Canada (St John's International Women's Film Festival; Female Eye Film Festival, Toronto; Vancouver International Women in Film Festival), with 3x 1-hour sessions of follow up coaching towards strategic career plans. Since attending the CAM, as of March 31, 2020, Penny Eizenga has attached producers to her feature ECHO (aka A Far Cry, also developed at Story & Leadership); Jessica Petelle has become A DGC member and is slated to direct on a series (Safe Haven) and 2nd Unit direct on a feature film; Lora Campbell has earned Harold Greenberg Fund support for a film she is producing (40 Acres).

WIDC AWARDS

WIDC Feature Film Award:



2019 Winner:

Presented at the Whistler Film Festival to **Pamela Gallant** for her debut feature drama, **Monica's News**. This award provides in kind support valued of up to \$200k in services and rentals. A WIDC mentorship and executive producing services are also part of the award. Set in 1974 rural Nova Scotia, Monica's News is the story of CASEY, a nine-year old girl who learns hard lessons about justice when her beloved cousin is murdered, and no one will listen to her claims about who committed the brutal crime. Gallant offers an adept expression of Casey's first glimpses of what it means to fight bravely and alone in a world not yet awake to the value of female voices. The film will be shot in Nova Scotia.

Previous WIDC Feature Film Award Winners:

Marie Clements', Red Snow had its world premiere at the Vancouver International Film Festival. The film had a highly successful Northern Canada tour, has won multiple awards including Best Canadian Feature at VIFF and EIFF. An original soundtrack featuring co-stars Mozahdah Jamalzadah (pictured at right with co-star Asivak Koostachin) was launched ahead of the theatrical release March 13, 2020 (A-71). The theatrical run was halted due to COVID-19. A VOD launch on iTunes is planned for May 15, 2020. The film has already earned nine awards and 12 nominations and will air on CBC September 19, 2020 at 9pm.



WIDC Feature Film Award (continued)



Sonia Bonspille Boileau's Rustic Oracle world premiered at the 2019 Vancouver International Film Festival and played a near sold out closing night at the St John's International Women's Film Festival. It played at ImagineNATIVE and the film earned Best Actress (Lake Delilse) and Supporting Actress (Carmen Moore) Awards at the American Indian Film Festival in San Francisco, will be released by Seventh Screen (picture above center Carmen Moore with Lake Delilse). The film has earned two awards and three nominations and will air on CBC in fall 2020.

Gloria Ui Young Kim's Queen of the Morning Calm, starring Tina Jung (Kim's Convenience), premiered at Whistler Film Festival, (pictured at world premiere above right with cast, Zahra Bentham, Gloria Ui Young Kim, Tina Jung, Samora Smallwood, Robert Ifedi), will continue its festival tour in 2020.



Shelley Thompson (Dawn, Her Dad & the Tractor) received Telefilm funding to go to camera summer 2020. Due to COVID-19 production plans are pending. Shelley also earned additional script development support through the Meryl Streep Nicole Kidman Women writers program, as well as an opportunity to pitch for international funding / sales at Through the Lens in Cannes. Shelley's short film Duck Duck Goose was featured in competition on CBC Short Film Face Off.

Garnering subsequent successes....

Siobhan Devine (The Birdwatcher) directed multiple episodes of Kim's Convenience, Gabby Duran & the Unsittables, and two MOWs (Always and Forever Christmas, Matching Hearts). She earned a Leo Ward for Best Direction on Kim's Convenience and a Leo Best Direction Nomination for the MOW Christmas Pen Pals.

Kathleen Hepburn's (Never Steady, Never Still), her second feature co-written and co-directed with Elle-Maija Tailfeathers, The Body Remembers When the World Broke Open was picked up by Ava DeVernay's ARRAY Releasing and has won multiple awards including the Toronto Film Critic's \$100k prize.

Jordan Canning (Suck It Up) directed multiple episodes of Schitt's Creek and Baroness Von Sketch Show and earned 2020 CSA nods for her work on both series.

Talent to Watch Nominee Mentorship Award:

Each of the nominated projects are receiving a 2-year WIDC mentorship to support the further development of their projects.

2018-2019 Award:

Meeshelle Neal, (BC) feature film, **Sweet Release**, a magic realism drama about a modern-day alchemist who stops death to save her daughter);

Paige Boudreau, (AB) feature film, **Just Off Main Street**, a coming of age drama about a young woman returning to her small hometown to find closure after her parents' death;

Ana de Lara, (BC) web series, Best Friend Me, a comedic exploration of the faces of depression and anxiety told from the POV Sam, a woman living with her alter-egos, Neg and Best Friend Me. Selected for funding by Telefilm.

2019-2020 Award:

Hayley Gray (BC) feature film, **Dry Year** is about ALICE (40's) whose family home is blazed by BC interior wildfire and her struggle to grieve and heal from her losses through her art.

Sarah Deakins (ON) web series, **Happenstance** explores human interconnectedness as we follow the lives of seemingly random people in a neglected part of Toronto's downtown core.

WIDC Short Works Award:

2018 (Kamloops) winner, **Cjay Boisclair's** short film **Stood Up** sponsored by TELUS STORYHIVE and starring Jason Burkart, Rekha Sharma and Tracey Powers world premiered at the St John's International Women's Film Festival and has been accepted into over 40 festival around the globe and has won or been nominated for 21 awards.

WIDC CBC Talent Development Award:

Announced at the 2019 Whistler Film Festival the \$10,000 story development prize supported by CBC Films will cover Story & Leadership program tuition plus a fee for a story consultant. The 2019 winners of this important new development prize are Winnipeg-based Cree filmmaker JJ Neepin for her feature film script, Luminous, Neepin's debut feature film about an Indigenous woman who has the power of second-sight; and BC-based Meeshelle Neal for her feature script, Sweet Release, about a modern-day alchemist who attempts to save her daughter's life by stopping death for the entire world. Neal and Neepin will be matched with story consultants to help them take their scripts to the next draft.

POLICIES

In 2015, the Board of Directors drafted a safety policy that focused on anti-harassment and anti-violence. This policy had been spoken about at the start of every workshop, and once it was formalized, it was quickly embedded into every WIDC contract, posted on the home page of the WIDC.ca web site and. In March 2020, when COVID-19 hit, the Board incorporated a health component to this policy. Since the 2019 AGM, the Board has carefully engaged in reflection, sought out further guidance and is in the consultation process of drafting meaningful, actionable policy that reflects WIDC's abiding commitment to inclusion and zero-tolerance for racism.

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




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
